LIBRARIES AND BOOK COLLECTIONS OF THE TEACHERS OF BLAJ DURING THE ENLIGHTENMENT*

Abstract: The purpose of the article is to present the book collections owned by the Transylvanian intellectuals of the eighteenth century in close connection with the cultural European trends of that time. Throughout the investigation, the author seeks to demonstrate a continuous interest of the Transylvanian scholars for the European values during the Enlightment period. The analysis revolves around the book collections owned by the teachers in Blaj, since they played a crucial role in shaping the future Transylvanian intellectuals.

During the Enlightenment, printed books and the occupation of several compartments and structures writing influenced of intellectual Europe, and a genuine "industrial revolution" in points of dimension and depth of the processes was noticed at the level of society¹. Indeed, an overview of the dissemination of printed books in eighteenth-century Europe shows, amongst other things: the existence and functioning of networks for the distribution of European books, either printed or handwritten, especially by the activation of book fairs; a diversification of book fairs in various cultural or academic centers on the continent, with unsuspected consequences on communication amongst readers and the enriching of their spiritual horizon; a soaring number of libraries and book collections at private and institutional levels, owing to the social quality of printing; economic prosperity, emphasis on and diversification of the cultural preoccupations for the educated social categories, as a result of the trade with encyclopedic
